HOME CARE BASICS FOR DELAWARE

WHO PROVIDES HOME CARE?

- Personal Assistance Services Agencies (PASA) Non-medical model offering personal care services.
- Home Health Aide Only Agencies (HHAO) Medical model offering personal care services with the care planning and supervision of a registered nurse.
- Home Health Skilled Agencies (HHAS) Medical model addressing skilled clinical services, i.e., occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, nursing treatments, private duty nursing.
- **Hospice** Palliative and supportive medical and other health services to terminally ill patients and their families.

HOW LONG DO PEOPLE RECEIVE HOME CARE?

- Episodic Care: Home care services can be for a limited time period, referred to as "episodic care," when the individual has a need for restorative care for a limited period of time, i.e., after a surgery.
- Extended Care: Home care services can be ongoing, referred to as "extended care," when the need is chronic and expected to continue, i.e., after a traumatic brain injury, medically complex children, frail seniors.
- Palliative/Terminal Care: End of life planning and hospice.

WHO RECEIVES HOME CARE?

- · Medically complex children and adults
- · Children and adults with intellectual disabilities
- Seniors and people with disabilities whose only alternative would otherwise be in a nursing facility
- People with deficits in one or more activities of daily living (ADL)
 (i.e., bathing, dressing, personal care needs)
- Individuals on Medicare who have an acute short-term need (i.e., hip replacement, wound care)
- · People with terminal illnesses
